


National Pet Week

National Pet Week is May 7th through the 13th and in honor of this week and our pets we have put together some information about pets and pet ownership.




Pet Ownership

Be a Responsible Pet Owner!

Owning a pet is a privilege, but the benefits of pet ownership come with responsibilities.

Avoid impulsive **decisions** when selecting a pet. 🐾 Select a pet that's **suited** to your **home** and **lifestyle**. 🐾 Keep only the type and number of **pets** for which you can provide appropriate food, water, **shelter**, **health care** and **companionship**.

🚫 **Commit** to the relationship for the **life** of your pet(s). 🐾 **Recognize** that pet ownership requires an **investment** of time and money. 🚫 Make sure your pet receives **preventive health care** (vaccinations, parasite control, etc.), as well as care for any illnesses or injuries. 🐾 **Provide** appropriate **exercise** and mental **stimulation**. 🐾 **Clean up** after your pet. 🚫 **Don't** allow your pet to **stray** or become **feral**. 🐾 Properly **socialize** and **train** your pet. 🚫 **Limit** your pet's reproduction through **spay/neuter**, containment, or **managed** breeding. 🐾 **Obey** all **local ordinances**, including licensing and leash requirements and noise control. 🐾 **Make sure** your pet is properly **identified** (i.e., tags, microchips, or tattoos) and keep its registration **up-to-date**. 🚫 **Prepare** for an **emergency** or disaster, including assembling an evacuation kit. 🚫 **Make alternate arrangements** if you can no longer provide care for your pet. 🐾 **Recognize** any decline in your pet's **quality of life** and make **timely decisions** in consultation with a **veterinarian**.

Caring for Pets in Hot Weather

Why?

Main method of ridding heat in cats and dogs is by panting.

Dogs and cats sweat only through their pads and feet.

Overheating may happen in pets because of breed, illness, age and circumstance.

Who is most at risk?

Pets who have survived an episode of heatstroke

Elderly Pets.

Pets confined to cars and carriers.

Dogs and cats with short and wide faces

Dogs with heart or breathing conditions.

Pets without access to water or shade.

Overweight Pets.

Hot Asphalt Test

Press the back of your hand firmly against the asphalt you plan to walk your pet on for 7 seconds to verify it will be comfortable for your dog.

During Warmer Seasons

Never leave your pet in your car, even in the shade with the windows cracked or in a stuffy room.

Use air conditioners to keep environment cool or fans to increase air circulation.

Walks should be at dawn and dusk (before 8am and after 6pm). Limit walks during the middle of the day.

Have ready access to cool, fresh water. Take a bottle of water with you when walking your pet. Leave an extra bowl of water in case one gets knocked over.

Signs of Heatstroke

Confusion, anxious or dazed expression

Warm to touch, Seizures

Start salivating and whining

Heavy Panting, Vomiting, Brick red gums

Diarrhea

Increased rectal temp.

Increased Heart Rate

Collapsing, stumbling, falling down

Laying down and reluctant to get up

Heatstroke leads to

- 🐾 Brain damage
- 🐾 Kidney damage or failure
- 🐾 Muscle damage
- 🐾 Liver failure
- 🐾 Bleeding/clotting
- 🐾 Lung damage
- 🐾 Bloody diarrhea
- 🐾 Seizures
- 🐾 Death














What to do if you suspect your pet is overheated

Spend no more than 5 minutes wetting down your pet all over with cool water (use hose, bucket, bath tub).

Do not delay seeking treatment. Do not take a 'wait and see approach'. Contact MetroVet at 312-583-1921 to let us know you are on your way.

Treatment at MetroVet will include IV fluids, plasma, oxygen and checking blood/urine tests to determine if organ damage has occurred.
